Creating a Pro-Home Culture in Dialysis Without Support From a Home Program



Creating a pro-home culture within a facility can empower both patients and staff. However, facilities with limited access to a home program face challenges in educating about home dialysis. This guide is intended to provide resources and strategies to educate your team about home dialysis even when a home dialysis facility isn't available.

What is home dialysis?

- Home dialysis refers to dialysis treatments that are completed in the comfort of a patient's own home.
- Home dialysis treatments may be completed independently by the patient or with assistance from a care partner.
- There are two different types of home dialysis treatments:
 - Peritoneal Dialysis Needleless dialysis that uses the peritoneal membrane along with dialysis solutions to help filter and remove extra fluid and waste products from the body.
 - Home Hemodialysis A process where the blood is filtered using an external filter to help remove extra fluid and waste products in the body. This process is similar to in-center hemodialysis but is completed in the home.

Why it is important to educate patients on home dialysis

- Home dialysis increases a patient's level of independence.
 - Patients have more flexibility in their schedules.
 - They can travel and dialyze around their schedule.
 - They spend less time in the dialysis clinic.
- Because they have more frequent treatments, patients tend to have better fluid volume control and increased energy levels.
- Home patients are very knowledgeable about their health and tend to have better clinical outcomes leading to decreased hospitalizations.



How to educate a facility without the support of a home program

- Invite home dialysis vendors to your facility to give handson demonstrations and discuss the benefits of home dialysis with both staff and patients.
- When available, have staff travel to a home program. Staff can then observe a home nurse to learn more and share their experiences with the in-center team and patients.
- Leverage virtual education programs and online resources.
 - Online resources can provide a great substitute for learning from a home dialysis program.
 - Virtual education can provide the opportunity to learn from experts and leaders in home dialysis.
 - Online resources can provide education for both staff and patients.
 - Often education can include training modules, video demonstrations, and personal experiences.
