Home Dialysis Emergency Quick Guide



Before an Emergency:

 Keep at least a five-day supply of extra dialysis supplies, medicine, food, and other needed items at home.



- Let your gas, electric, and water companies know you do home dialysis. Ask if they can prioritize you if the power or water goes out.
- PD (peritoneal dialysis): If you use a cycler, make sure you have manual supplies that are not expired.
- Know how to do a manual exchange. Keep your instructions in a safe place where you can easily find them.
- Pack an emergency bag with:
 - A copy of your dialysis orders
 - A list of your medicines, including dose and how often you take them (and allergies, if needed)
 - A flashlight with extra batteries
 - A phone charger
 - Snacks and water

If the Power Goes Out:

 Call your home dialysis nurse. Let them know your power is out and review your emergency plan.



- HHD (home hemodialysis): You might need to go to a dialysis clinic for a while. Have a backup plan.
- PD: If the power is out for a long time, you may need to do manual exchanges.

If You Lose Water:

 If the water is off but the power is still on, you can still do dialysis but boil the water first to make sure it's clean.



 Don't use dirty or unsafe water for your machine or supplies.

If You Need to Leave Your Home (Evacuate):

 Have a plan! Know where your closest shelter is. A medical shelter is best.



- If it's safe, bring your dialysis supplies with you.
- Your safety comes first! If you can't take your supplies, leave them and get to a safe place.
